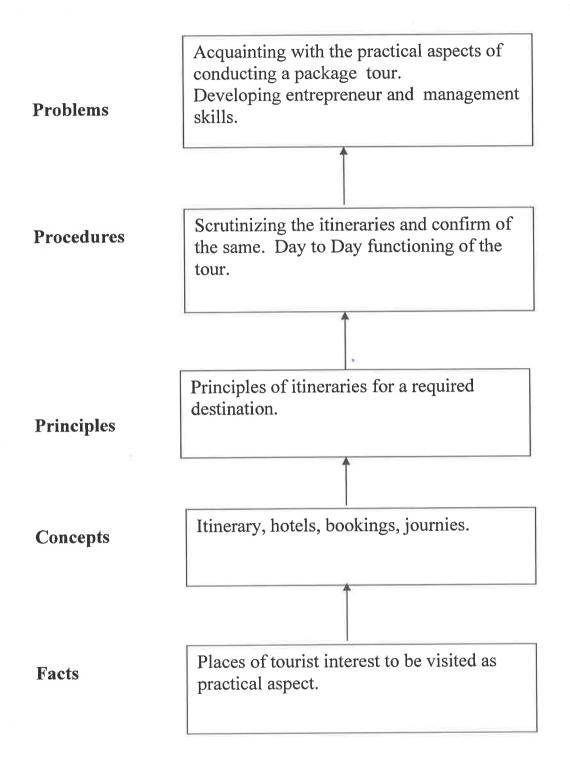

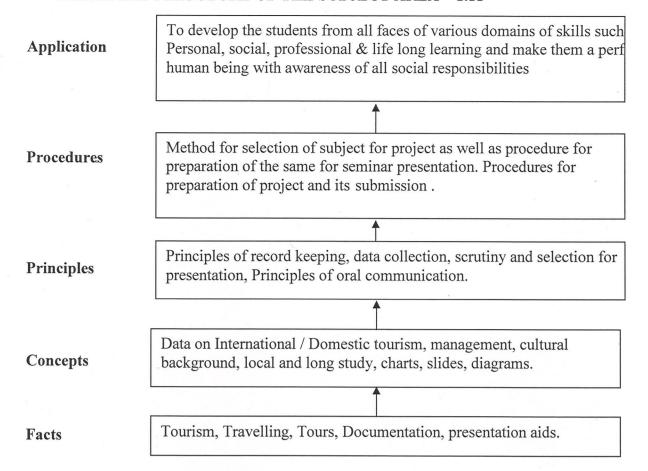
#### RATIONALE
